Procedure for Students Requesting Housing Accommodations at EMCC:

- Contact the Office of Residential Life to fill out a housing application and pay a \$100 housing deposit. (Because of the high volume of applicants, students can submit their housing application/Housing Deposit at the same time as their application for acceptance). The Residential Life director is Alissa Gervais, agervais@emcc.edu
- 2. Schedule an Intake appointment with the Disability Services to discuss possible accommodations. The Coordinator of Disability Services is Elizabeth Atkinson, eatkinson@emcc.edu
- 3. **Provide documentation** of your disability (submit prior to intake meeting) from a qualified physician Please include very specifically what housing accommodations are needed such as ADA accessibility or a single room. For single room request documentation, see below.
- 4. Disability Services will review your documentation and make a decision per your request and will contact you back.
- 5. Disability Services will make contact with the Office of Residential Life if the single room request is approved.
- 6. The Office of Residential Life will contact you with a housing placement when one is available.

Housing accommodation requests are filled on a first come first serve basis each semester. The deadline to request housing accommodations for a documented disability is August 1st. After August 1st, the Office of Residential Life will release ADA rooms to the general student population.

DOCUMENTATION GUIDELINES:

Disability-related documentation for *single room requests* from a qualified provider such as a medical doctor, a licensed psychologist, therapist, or another medical professional who is capable of making such a determination must include the following:

- 1. Please describe the length of time the health professional has been working with the student
- 2. Whether the student has a verified disability
- 3. A description of how the single room serves as an accommodation for the verified disability, including the symptoms that will be mitigated by the single room.
- 4. How the need for the single room relates to the ability of the student to use and enjoy a college's residential housing
- 5. Whether the single room in residential housing will cause stress or otherwise negatively affect the student's ability to succeed in a college environment;
- 6. Any consequences related to the disability that may result if the accommodation is not approved
