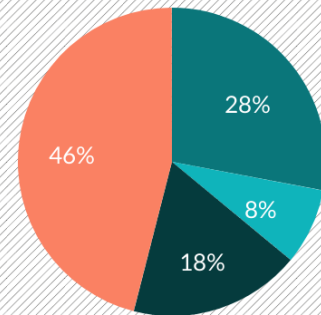

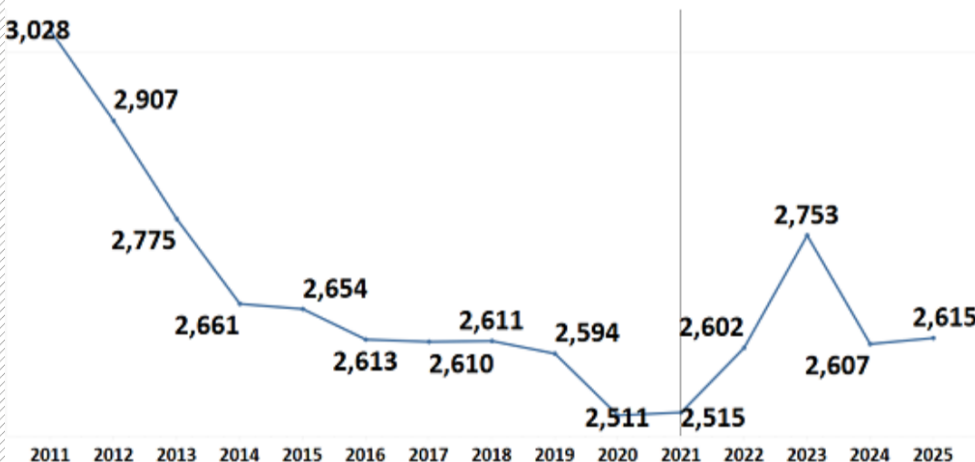

Notes and Data Sources

Student Overview

All statistics are based on the fall 2019 MCCS Data Mart snapshots except where otherwise noted.

A student is considered to know what career they are seeking if they are enrolled in a career/technical program of study.

A student is “first generation” if neither parent has earned a bachelor’s degree.

Statistics regarding students living paycheck to paycheck and working more than 20 hours a week are from the 2016 administration of the Community College Survey of Student Engagement (CCSSE).

Pell eligibility is determined solely by expected family contribution (EFC). For the 2019-2020 award year, the EFC cutoff for a Pell grant is \$5,576. For more information, see <https://ifap.ed.gov/dpcletters/GEN1901.html>.

Retention rates are based on the cohort of students who entered as first-time or transfer-in students, enrolled full- or part-time, in the fall of 2018.

Three-year outcomes are based on the cohort of students who entered the college as first-time or transfer-in students, enrolled full- or part-time, in the fall of 2016. A student is counted as “not attending” if they did not graduate by August 31, 2019, were not enrolled in fall 2019, and were not found in the National Student Clearinghouse.
